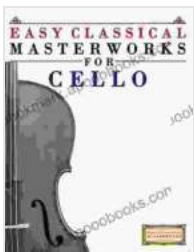

Johann Sebastian Bach

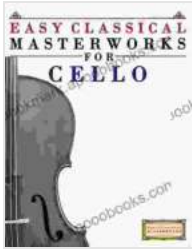

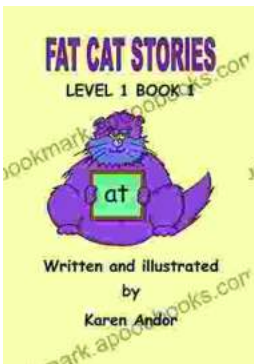

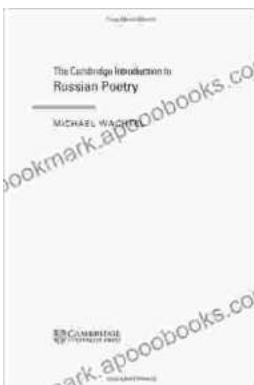
